<u>TASK 1:</u>

- Please try to purchase your own copy of the core textbook: *Pearson Edexcel A Level Politics <u>2nd edition</u>: UK Government and Politics, Political Ideas and US Government and Politics by David Tuck, Sarra Jenkins, John Jefferies This will be invaluable. This is available at <u>Amazon</u> new but can also be purchased second hand at a considerably lower price. Also you can share the cost with another student as it comes with access to a digital copy too.*
- 2. Watch and read about a political event occurring this summer. This should be a UK political issue affecting the UK government and people. Typically, this will involve a conflict over ideas, interests or power. This could involve the Prime Minister, government ministers, MPs or local government representatives. Examples might include but are not limited to: issues arising between the UK and EU, UK domestic issues such as local elections, matters to do with government ministers, clashes between central and local government, conflicts between or within political parties, issues over Scottish independence.

Prepare a short PowerPoint presentation of your chosen event (3-4 slides maximum). Your presentation should include:

- A summary outline of the event and people involved
- An understanding of the points of conflict, showing each sides view.
- Any resolution or proposed resolutions to the issue.

This will be presented in our first lesson.
